Five researchers from Abertay University in Scotland made the trip to Norway for the iAge midterm conference. 3 of us headed out on the preceeding Sunday to co-host a PHD course in Usability Evaluation at the Unvirsity of Agder in Grimstad. Working with staff and students from the Hanze Institute and from Agder we spent two days covering psychological issues in usability, research methods and then spent time doing co-design sessions for usable applications for people with low vision.
