The trouble with ICZM......

- Implementation of ICZM has been ad hoc
- The ICZM Principles have little meaning unless applied to an issue
- Many actors have trouble defining ICZM
- Most examples of successful ICZM are local in scale

But....

- EU Maritime Policy
- Marine Spatial Planning

.....we have to make ICZM work

The solution.....?



- A second generation of ICZM protocol is necessary, to enable actors to meet these challenges.
- to augment the original principles,
- To give *substance* to ICZM, which is otherwise abstract
- To provide common themes for integration at regional and higher levels

The project.....



- Will provide a clear sense of direction as to the principle challenges for sustainable management of the coast through the process of ICZM.
- Initial work has identified the following priority issues:
 - the integration of marine spatial planning,
 - improving practice in stakeholder engagement,
 - resolving institutional and other barriers to implementation, and
 - examining the role of business in ICZM.



The project.....

To these *process* issues can be added sectoral/technical issues:

- Water management, through a whole catchment approach pollution, flooding, sediment supply (from rivers)
- **Sediment transport** (the 'engine of coastal processes') erosion (and its terrestrial impacts), coastal defence, beach recharge, dredging, coastal habitat creation, coastal ecosystems
- Transport of goods (road, rail, ports, shipping)
- Energy generation (renewables, nuclear, connections to grid, cables, oil and gas, carbon capture and storage)

These four encompass the majority of **large-scale** coastal management issues operating at a regional sea scale – two natural systems, two human systems



In detail.....

The project will

- Select two sector issues for detailed analysis through case studies
- Focus on boundary issues for marine planning: coast and international boundaries at sea
- Stakeholder engagement must be taken to a new level, recognising Social contract, Public Trust Doctrine principles etc, and the **rights of citizens** to understand and to play a meaningful role in policy. Possibly through joint working between **existing regional networks**
- There is much good practice regarding ICZM. Why is everyone not doing it? More needs to be understood regarding organisational barriers to integration and how they can be overcome – structures for integration, internal and external
- **Business** is only marginally involved in the ICZM process. How can this be addressed?

Project outcomes.....



- a better and shared understanding of pressures and trends for change in coastal regions of the North Sea
- the application of a new approach to implementation of ICZM in delivering sustainable development against a background of economic growth, in the form of an ICZM Protocol. Giving actors clear guidance on priorities for integration at Regional Sea and Regional scales.
- a better ability to adapt policies, programmes, and actions, towards common sustainable development goals at transnational, regional and local scales and to meet the challenges of the EU Growth and Jobs, and Sustainable Development Strategies, and of the Maritime Policy.
- better and more integrated working between regional ICZM initiatives leading to more efficient territorial planning and, therefore, a more conducive environment to economic growth.

Progress to date.....



- A generally positive pre-assessment was received, especially regarding transnationality
- However, the timing was not right and some partners have withdrawn
- Opportunity now to reassess and find new partners
