- 2 important questions:
 - 1. Is the environment important?
 - 2. If so, how important is it?





FOCUS 1:

Environmental Implications

Question 1: Is the environment important?

Answer: YES, for 3 main reasons:

1. Use value

2. Non-use value

3. Life-support services





Question 2: How important is it?

Answer: Varying value, unquantifiable value

 Varying value: human existence necessitates interaction with all aspects of environment

Invaluable: without it, we cannot exist

 How healthy is our environment? How healthy should it be?
